YEAR 3 FEED THE WORLD

This term, Room 4 has been learning about some of the problems that children around the world face and finding out what we can do to help.

In Week 5, we hosted some of the junior classes to present our learning. We took our visitors on a trip around the world to find out more about:

Indonesia, where Christians are being persecuted (treated badly and unfairly) for their faith. Their churches are often damaged or destroyed by other people.

Sudan, where children and families are getting sick and dying because of famine - more than 24 million people don't have enough food to eat, and don't know where to get food from.

Saudi Arabia, where if Christians worship in public, they could go to jail and their family and friends might not want to see them any more.

Finally, we came back home to **Aotearoa New Zealand** where many children suffer because of racism, (getting treated unfairly, left out, or made fun of because of their country, their culture, or the colour of their skin).

Volunteers tried to build a church out of popsicle sticks, estimate how much rice was in the containers, and 'keep the faith' by worshipping God in our Secret Church game. We role-played what to do when you hear or see someone being racist so that you can show aroha and help the person in need, and we shared examples of some of the artwork that we have made for persecuted children in Asia.

What can your family do to help?

- Research charities and choose one to donate to. Room 4 recommends UNICEF's Paddington postcards for 4-10 year olds.
- Make artwork or write a letter to Christian children in Central Asia. You can find out more information on the guidelines and where to send your work to at: https://opendoors.org.nz/frontline-faith/encouragement-for-children-in-central-asia/
- Be kind, show interest in others, and stand up for them.
